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Student Objectives

Graduates of the MSPH program are expected to be able to:

- Articulate the principles that are basic to public health, including methods for assessing the determinants of the population's health;
- Communicate effectively with colleagues, in and out of public health, and the lay public, about the scientific principles that form the basis of the discipline;
- Analyze published literature in public health, including the application of relevant aspects of epidemiology and biostatistics;
- Explain the variability in access to care and public health resources, including the workforce in the United States and abroad;
- Articulate the role of psychosocial factors as they relate to personal behavior, public health communications, education and impact;
- Describe the major environmental health hazards, their effects on individuals, their assessment and development of policies for protection of the public's health;
- Serve as a resource for information on health services, including aspects of healthcare financing and outcomes measurement;
- Delineate the legal and ethical principles that inform public health practice.

During the day, I am the Director of the Epidemiology Unit at the Philadelphia Department of Public Health (PDPH), Division of Disease Control, but you may know me better from such roles as instructor for Principles of Epidemiology (MI 580) or thesis committee chair. I also recently joined the MSPH curriculum committee.

The main job of my unit at the health department is to review and plot the infectious disease surveillance data for the city. We are always on the search for any disease clusters or outbreaks that require investigation. We also collaborate with other PDPH staff on evaluations and cost-

benefit analyses of PDPH initiatives, including the city's *Chlamydia* screening program for high-school students. Being an epidemiologist for the city is a bit like being in pre-school: we spend a lot of time counting and making pretty pictures, and then at 2:00, we take a nap. (My boss isn't on this mailing list, is she?) Before becoming an epidemiologist, I was a veterinarian for the San Francisco SPCA. After 4 years as a practicing vet, I decided to institutionalize myself by entering a PhD program at Cornell University. My dissertation focused on the long-term effects of early age

spaying and neutering in dogs and cats. (I'm sure those of you who have taken my class will want to know that this was a retrospective cohort study using both random and systematic sampling. The measure of association was an incidence rate ratio.) While at Cornell, I also conducted research on infections that people can pick up from companion animals and urban wildlife and wrote guidelines for how to prevent such infections. When I'm not working as an epidemiologist or teaching (torturing) JCGS students, you can usually find me playing cello with the Cypress Trio or the Orchestra Society of Philadelphia. I also enjoy dog training, camping with my partner, and ingesting caffeine and other methylxanthines. (Vic Spain, DVM, PhD)


