Send an email message to [LISTSERV@STL.NASA.GOV](mailto:LISTSERV@STL.NASA.GOV) with the message "subscribe SLA-aero", followed by your name. You can try the Engineering Division listserv, too, by sending the message "subscribe SLA-eng" to [MAJORDOMO@IEE.ORG](mailto:MAJORDOMO@IEE.ORG), and I don't think you need to include your name either. If this doesn't work, send the message again and include your name.

A third thing we can do is to talk to engineering/aerospace members via the listserv. We need to know what's happening and what's on your mind. You don't have to have a problem, or need help, to start a dialogue ... but, that is a good reason, too. You can volunteer for something, even if it's just for something little. To me, a task is easier with lots of hands to help ... and it's more fun.

Fifth. say thank you to any of the vendors who have given us support. Without them we would not have been able to give you the kind of programs you need to expand your personal and professional lives. One vendor in particular is responsible for the new Aerospace Section Directory, which went to the printer July 7. Thanks for that goes to Carroll Publishing. #### **Minutes of the Aerospace Section of the Engineering Division**

**Annual business meeting, June 9, 1997, Seattle**

Kathy Harkness, outgoing chair, welcomed everyone to the annual

business meeting and breakfast, and then introduced current and incoming officers. She also recognized organizations that have supported the Aerospace Section during the year. They include IAA and the McGraw-Hill Aviation Group for sponsoring the breakfast, Carroll Publishing for underwriting the cost of the membership directory, and Faxon for partial support of the George Mandel Award.

Recognized next was Dottie Moon, who was introduced as the 1997 recipient of the George Mandel Memorial Award. She was selected for the award for the many contributions she has made to the division and section, including serving as a chair.

Don Welch, treasurer, then reported that two Aerospace Section accounts have been closed, with the proceeds being given to the Engineering Division, as required by SLA bylaws. The George Mandel Memorial Award account will be closed in the near future; the funds of that account will also be given to the Engineering Division. The section, though, will control the funds from the account even though the Engineering Division will manage disbursement.

Old business included a recap of activities required to switch from a division to a section. Kathy thanked everyone for their support during the year and encouraged everyone to support the Aerospace Section and the Engineering Division in the future.

Under new business, Kathy outlined some of her goals for the future. Those goals included updating the Criss Cross Directory and changing

the bylaws to allow money to be given to division chairs and chair elects to help cover travel expenses to annual conferences.

The nominating committee, consisting of Dottie Moon and Margie Pearson, reported that one of the advantages to being a section rather than a division is that only one officer is required --the- section chair. Don Welch was nominated and elected to the position of Aerospace Section chair for 1998-99.

Kathy then turned the meeting over to Mary Ellen McMurtrie, incoming chair. Mary Ellen shared some of her ideas for the section for 1997-98 and presented an update on some of the conference program ideas for next year in Indianapolis. She also presented Kathy with a beautiful gift.

Information suppliers each had a few minutes to discuss new products and services within their organizations. Karen Holloway represented AIAA and announced that free stress balls were available at the door, Ed Pinto gave a lively summary of the aerospace industry and introduced his associate Peggy Triband, and Lela Harris and Susan David both updated us on new developments at Carroll Publishing.

After quickly going around the room and introducing ourselves the meeting closed with the announcement that a few remaining free Aerospace Division t-shirts were available at the door. The shirts were the last of 135 made for the 1994 annual conference in Atlanta.

## **ACCOUNTING WE WILL GO**

A pair of accounts at a bank in California have been closed, leaving one to close at a bank in Colorado. More than \$5,000 remains in that account, and most of that is earmarked for disbursement as George Mandel Memorial Award funds. Of \$5,186.84 in the account, \$3,475.44 is for the GMMA. Also in the account is \$1,711.40 sent in April by the SLA. That, however, is an allotment for members that should have been sent to the Engineering Division. At the request of the SLA, though, the funds were deposited in the account, with the stipulation being made that the section transfer them to the Engineering Division as soon as possible. All of the funds will be transferred now since a transfer of \$500 to the GMMA recipient - Dottie Moon - has been completed.

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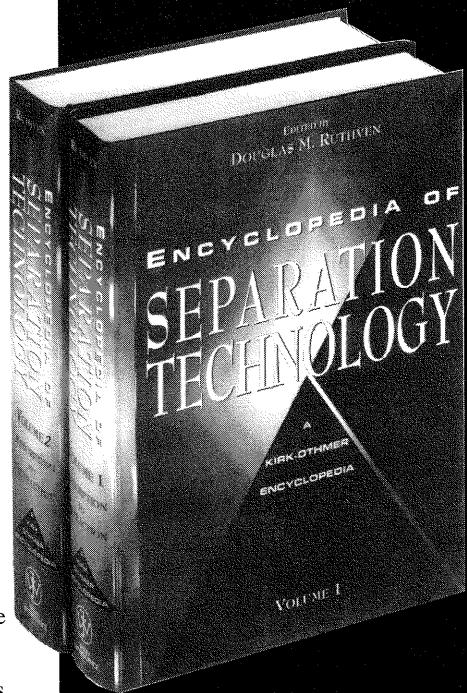
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
