A FUNDING THING HAPPENED ... (A Report by the Treasurer, Don Welch)

The division, thanks chiefly to Mala Sistla, already has received funds and/or donations from Mead Data Central and the AIAA. The division also has received a bill from SLA for incurred

conference expenses. The result of these transactions (when they are posted) is that the division is not as rich as it was.

The division really needs a fund-raiser. Even though Sandy Spurlock, the division treasurer for the last two years, reported during annual conference that the division still had a little more than \$16,000.00, a fund-raiser needs to get started now so that we have the startup and promotional funds to fund it until it pays for itself.

An idea I had recently was to represent an overseas publisher in marketing and handling the sales of a book or series of books ... in the U.S., of course. I'm uncertain of the mechanics of doing this, and I don't have a book or books in mind, but that's the idea I had. I got the idea from a mailing Eiron Press of Washington, D.C., sent me. It included a catalog from Cepadues, the publisher of French National Space Agency books and monographs. Eiron, obviously, was selling Cepadues books in the U.S.

To go a little farther with this idea (of selling books) maybe we could resurrect a book that's gone OP and have it republished. I'll bet there are books you had that are missing, or have been trying to find for years, that a lot of us could use ... if they were still in print. What do you think? Anybody got ideas on what would sell? What they'd buy?

By the way, Sandy (Spurlock), who was mentioned above, has changed jobs and is no longer in an aerospace industry library. So, she's not only having to surrender the title and duties of the division treasurer this year, but she may have to drop, or at least curtail, her dealings with division members. Even though I still haven't gotten the division's accounts and papers from her (and it's October 8 as I write this), it's going to be kind of sad to see her breaking that connection. I celebrate her moving to a new job, though; she'll be the director of the Inhalation Toxicology Research Institute library in Albuquerque, NM.

A committee of 15 persons, many now from the Aerospace Division, will be discussing, and building, contacts and plans for AIAA and SLA/Aerospace Division cooperation and growth through sharing information.

The chair of the committee is Dr. Tom Pinelli, a division member. He is also with the AIAA, and he said recently that the committee is one of several the AIAA has started to try and "establish the foundations and relationships" that the AIAA (and partners) will need to continue to move forward in the years ahead. He said the committee would be interested particularly in discussing and communicating developments of an educational focus.

He said the committee, the Technical Information Committee of the AIAA, will be looking initially at building professional relationships and communicating effectively. Secondarily, it will be trying to help improve the access and use of information ... through education.
