Jefferson Digital Commons Quarterly Update: April – June 2013

It's been another terrific quarter for the [Jefferson Digital Commons \(JDC\)](#) with 193 new items added. [View the complete quarterly inventory.](#)

The most popular download this quarter was a Jefferson School of Population Health capstone presentation: [Type II Diabetes and Dietary Preferences in a Rapidly Urbanizing Region of West Africa](#) by Megan Doherty, with over 170 downloads since being added to the JDC April 15th.

The JDC currently holds 7,890 assets which have generated total 1,499,769 downloads. Total download count for this quarter went from 1,331,432 to 1,440,769 for a grand total of 109,337. Content archived in the JDC is being found on the web and download numbers continue to rise. The most recent round of [grand round presentations in Pulmonary and Critical Care Medicine](#), which just concluded and will start again in September, have over 9,100 hits for the 90 archived presentations. And the [historical items in the JDC](#) continue to be incredibly popular. From Jan 2013 to the present, the historical items have generated over 31,000 downloads.
