#### DOCTOR OF HUMANE LETTERS-REVELLE W. BROWN

Mr. Brown's remarkable career began in 1900, at the age of seventeen. First a laborer on the Illinois Division of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad, within months he had advanced to fireman and a few years later was promoted to locomotive engineer. He held this position for seven years and then accepted his first supervisory post, Road Foreman of Engines.

Throughout the years, Mr. Brown constantly sought self-improvement and professional proficiency by strict application to duty and on-the-job training. These efforts enabled him to move ahead rapidly in his chosen career. By 1930 he was the Vice President and General Manager of the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey. Advancing steadily, he moved to Vice President of Reading Company and the Central Railroad of New Jersey. He held these posts until 1941 when he was elected President of the Lehigh Valley Railroad. Then, in 1944, he returned to the Reading Company as President, where he remained until he retired from the presidency in September 1951, but he continues his interest in company affairs in his present capacity as a Director and as Chairman of the Executive Committee.

During the past twenty retirement years, he has served with distinction as a railroad consultant to the governments of Norway, Colombia (South America) and India. In addition to the Reading Company, he is serving as Director, Chairman or Trustee of many organizations including the John Wanamaker Estate, and the Philadelphia Savings Fund Society. He has contributed his leadership and personal dedication, with great success, to many civic and philan-thropic enterprises. He was an early Campaign Chairman of the Community Chest and, following its reorganization into the United Fund, was one of its early presidents. He has been a Life Trustee of the Jefferson Medical College of Philadelphia starting in 1952, and is now Emeritus Trustee of Thomas Jefferson University. He continues, also, as a Trustee of the Stephen Girard Estate, as Chairman of the Youth Study Center (of Philadelphia), as Chairman of the McKee Scholarship Committee, and pursues vigorously his lifelong activity in youth work through his affiliation with the Philadelphia Council of the Boy Scouts of America, and other organizations.

Mr. Brown left Carlyle High School, Illinois, when he was in the 11th grade. Fifty years later, he returned to receive his high school diploma with the Class of 1952. But before this, he was the recipient of the honorary degrees of Doctor of Laws from University of Pennsylvania, Doctor of Laws from Dickinson College, and Doctor of Letters from Ursinus College.

In 1959, he was chosen as one of the Fifty Philadelphians who, during the past half century, contributed most toward the growth, welfare and prosperity of the entire Community.

#### DOCTOR OF LAWS-GEORGE JACOB WILLAUER

Born in Stockertown, Pennsylvania, on September 11, 1896, Dr. Willauer received the B.S. degree from Franklin and Marshall in 1917. After serving two years as an officer in the United States Army he entered Jefferson Medical College, receiving the M.D. degree in 1923. His internship experience and his deep interest in thoracic surgery led to post-doctoral study abroad under Doctors Ferdinand Sauerbruck in Munich and Wolfgang Denk in Vienna. Upon returning in 1926 and while continuing studies at the Daniel Baugh Institute of Anatomy he was appointed to the faculty of Jefferson Medical College, where he advanced rapidly to Clinical Professor of Surgery.

Founder of the American Board of Thoracic Surgery, Dr. Willauer holds certification also by the American Board of Surgery.

of Surgery. His hospital appointments have included: Director of Surgery, President of the Medical Staff, and Director of the Department of Anesthesia at Methodist Hospital; Director of Surgery at Eagleville Sanatorium, Chief of Clinic, Surgeon, and Director of the Division of Anesthesia at Jefferson Medical College Hospital; and Assistant Surgeon at Roxborough Memorial Hospital and at Bryn Mawr Hospital.

Dr. Willauer has introduced many new surgical procedures, especially notable are those for the treatment of pulmonary tuberculosis and massive trauma to the thorax. He has devised new anesthesia procedures, he organized the first varicose vein clinic in eastern United States, and performed the first successful pneumonectomy, with patient survival, in eastern Pennsylvania.

His skill and professional stature early attracted to Jefferson Medical College an unusual number of young physicians for residency training in thoracic and general surgery. In admiration and in gratitude his former students commissioned the painting of his portrait which now hangs amid those of other eminent physicians and medical scientists in Jefferson's historic portrait collection.

The major learned medical organizations, and local and state assemblies, have benefited by his activities and counsel, and by his leadership. Among the many presidencies and chairmanships formerly held by Dr. Willauer are those of the Philadelphia Academy of Surgery, the J. Aitken Meigs Medical Association, and the Pennsylvania Association for Thoracic Surgery. He is also a Past-President of America's largest living medical Alumni body, that of Jefferson Medical College. Currently he serves with distinction as Honorary Clinical Professor of Surgery, as Chairman of Thomas Jefferson University Founders Association, and as an Alumnus Member of the Board of Trustees.

#### DOCTOR OF SCIENCE—ARTHUR OSOL

Born in Riga, Latvia, December 1, 1905, Dr. Osol came to Philadelphia in 1906, receiving his education at the Philadelphia College of Pharmacy and Science (B.Sc. and M.S. degrees) and at the University of Pennsylvania (M.S. and Doctor of Philosophy degrees). He also completed post-graduate studies at New York University, University of Pennsylvania, and Oak Ridge Institute of Nuclear Studies. In 1964, Eastern Baptist College conferred on him the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws. His professional career started as an Assistant in Chemistry at Philadelphia College of Pharmacy and Science in 1928, with successive propriets to Passace of Chemistry at Philadelphia College of Pharmacy and Science in 1928, with successive promotions to Professor of Chemistry, Director of the Department of Chemistry, Dean of Science and finally to President of the College of Pharmacy and Science, the challenging post he continues to hold with great distinction.

As president, his Program for Progress has resulted in an extensive building program and in many academic advances at his College. Dr. Osol's principal research interests are in the development of laboratory procedures for testing purity of drugs, and while chairman of a *United States Pharmacopeia* chemical subcommittee, such methods were developed for nearly 1,000 drugs included in the Pharmacopeia. He did collaborative research, also, for the League of Nations Health Committee on methods for testing opium and coca. During World War II he was a member of the Science Advisory Committee of the Federal Smaller War Plants Corporation. After the war he was Chief of the Chemical Branch of the Philadelphia Civil Defense Council, and organized a chemical training program for chemists assigned to civil defense in the Philadelphia area.

Dr. Osol has published over 200 scientific papers and written or edited 20 books, is Editor-in-Chief of the *United States Dispensatory*, Chairman of the Editorial Board of Blakiston-McGraw-Hill Medical Dictionaries; and Chairman of the Editorial Board of Remington's Pharmaceutical Sciences.

Dr. Osol is officer, fellow or member of many organizations and honorary societies. He is President of the West Philadelphia Corporation and a Director of the University City Science Center and of the Philadelphia Science Council. He has served, also, as President of the Philadelphia Chapter of the American Pharmaceutical Association, Chairman of the Philadelphia Section of the American Chemical Society and of the Philadelphia Section of the Electrochemical Society. Among his civic activities he is a Trustee of International House, a Director of the Philadelphia Rotary Club and, also, of the Philadelphia Tuberculosis Association.

#### DOCTOR OF SCIENCE—GEORGE WASHINGTON CORNER

Born December 12, 1889, Dr. Corner was educated at Johns Hopkins University (A.B. 1909, M.D., 1913). Following junior faculty positions at the Hopkins and University of California he was appointed Professor of Anatomy at the University of Rochester in 1923. In 1940 he was called to Baltimore as Director of the Department of Embryology of the Carnegie Institution of Washington, and then in 1956 to the Rockefeller Institute, New York, as Medical Historian. Four years later he assumed his present post, Editor and Executive Officer of the American Philosophical Society, in Philadelphia, America's oldest and highest ranking learned organization.

Dr. Corner's classic embryological, anatomical and physiological studies on mammalian reproductive cycles, in-

cluding primates, led to the discovery of the corpus luteum hormone, progesterone. For these signal contributions he has been called the father of modern reproductive biology. His scientific leadership has stimulated and has sharply accelerated the advances in biologic sciences experienced in recent years. Few Americans have developed the astonishing facility to achieve the mastery over the several areas of scholarly activity that has characterized Dr. Corner's career. In the humanities his contributions to the history of medicine, started nearly fifty-seven years ago, include several books,

numerous published articles and essays, biographies, and his autobiography, Anatomist at Large.

Dr. Corner's remarkable achievements and his scholarly pursuits have won cherished honors and recognitions at home and abroad. He has been awarded honorary degrees from the Catholic University in Chile, University of Rochester, Boston University, University of Chicago, Tulane University, Temple University, Woman's Medical College of Pennsylvania, Oxford University, and the University of Pennsylvania.

sylvania, Oxford University, and the University of Pennsylvania.

He has held numerous honorary, visiting, and research professorships and lectureships here and in England. He has received the Squibb Award of the Society for the Study of Internal Secretions, the Presidential Certificate of Merit, the Passano Foundation Award, and is an Honorary Fellow of Balliol College, Oxford and, also, of the Royal Society the Passano Foundation Award, and is an Honorary Fellow of Balliol College, Oxford and, also, of the Royal Society of Edinburg and the Royal College of Obstetrics and Gynecology of London. A Fellow of the International Institute of Embryology he holds membership, also, in the Royal Society of London, American Association of Anatomists (president 1946-48), Society for Experimental Biology and Medicine, American Philosophical Society, National Academy of Sciences, Anatomical Society of Great Britain (hon.), American Association of the History of Medicine, Phi Beta Kappa, Sigma Xi, and many others. He serves as foreign correspondent for numerous American learned societies, as well.

Dr. Corner has written fourteen books and has contributed to many others. He has published over 200 articles on reproductive history of Medicine and Medicine and

reproductive biology, embryology, anatomy, endocrine system, history of Medicine and of Anatomy, biography (including an autobiography), on science and learned scientific and philosophical organizations.

#### THE ACADEMIC COSTUME

The wearing of academic dress dates back to the early days of the oldest universities in the world. In the American Council on Education's book entitled "American Universities and Colleges" it is suggested that "gowns may have been counted necessary for warmth in the unheated buildings frequented by medieval scholars. Hoods seem to have served to cover the tonsured head . . . "

Throughout the years European universities have continued to show great diversity in their academic dress. American universities, on the other hand, when they decided to adopt academic dress about fifty years ago, immediately established a code of regulations which today is followed by almost all American institutions. The establishment of this code has made it possible to distinguish the Bachelors, Masters, and Doctors and at the same time recognize the university which has given them the degree.

The Bachelor's gown has pointed sleeves and is worn closed. The Master's gown has oblong sleeves, open at the wrist. The rear part of its oblong shape is square cut and the front part has an arc cut away, and is worn open or closed. The Doctor's gown has bell-shaped sleeves. It is worn opened or closed. Cotton poplin or similar material is used for the Bachelor's and Master's degrees, and rayon or silk ribbed material is used for the Doctor's degree.

The hoods vary in length: 48 inches for the Doctor's degree, 42 inches for the Master's, and 36 inches for the Bachelor's. All hoods are lined in silk in the academic color or colors of the institution conferring the degree. If the institution has more than one color, the colors are shown in divisions using chevrons. The binding or edge of the hood is usually made of velvet in the color designating the subject in which the degree was granted.

Black mortarboards are worn for all degrees.
