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

Recap of the Year

In the two years since the COVID-19 pandemic, Jefferson (and the rest of the world) has adapted to a more versatile and hybrid way of working, collaborating, and learning. That flexibility has allowed us in the Academic Commons to pursue new and creative initiatives and practices of work to ensure we're supporting all of our Jefferson community – whether online or in person.

In 2022-2023, the Gutman Library became a hub of activity for students and staff on the East Falls campus craving in-person connection, and within the next year, Center City's Archives & Special Collections in Scott Library will transform to provide renovated physical space for research, collaboration, and learning. The AV Equipment Services and Educational Technologies teams continued supporting the hybrid classroom for people working and learning online and helped instructors build confidence with new at-home educational tools. New online communities and self-paced modules allowed instructors to build community and learn in convenient ways. These self-paced modules and more are advertised on our new Academic Commons website. The new site makes it easier to find resources, register for workshops, and browse our expert work in photography, design, and video production.

Jefferson Libraries

Library Help Sessions & Consultations

3,134 total Jefferson Libraries implemented a new ticketing system for "Live Chats" and launched a combined Library Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ) website for Gutman, Dixon, and Scott Libraries. Staff can now analyze trends in Live Chats, including common questions, most popular times of day to seek assistance, etc., which will influence updates in ways of working, website content, and more to best support our library visitors.

Gutman Library's Reference Services staff initiated a new "doorbell" reference structure at the Information Desk, helping students feel comfortable asking for reference support and making the librarians approachable and accessible.

2,563 Scott In Spring 2023, the Access Services teams from Gutman and Scott libraries gathered for a retreat to get to know each other and design future initiatives to help Jefferson students, instructors, and researchers.



Student Programming at Gutman Library







As the Fall 2022 semester began, the Gutman Library was eager to provide students with opportunities to connect with library staff and each other. Staff launched three programs that will continue in the years to come. Coffee with a Librarian is a weekly program offering students an informal setting to grab a snack, ask a librarian a question, or get to know staff. **Documentary** Film Nights provide a safe space to build community around a shared interest while watching and discussing films. Brain Breaks, run during Reading Days and Finals Week, allow students to refuel with food/drink, enjoy stress-relieving activities, and even hang out with service dogs. In Spring 2023, to celebrate International Women's Day, the library hosted Intersectional Feminisms, which coincided with a library collection of resources about sexism, misogyny, and misogynoir. In total, library staff led **56 events** for students at East Falls.

Expanding Open Access Publishing Opportunities

Jefferson Libraries created more open access publishing opportunities for Jefferson scholars in 2022-2023. In addition to the Jefferson Open Access Publishing Fund, Jefferson authors can now publish in applicable Wiley, Hindawi, and American Chemical Society (ACS) journals. These institutional open access agreements waive Article Processing Charges (APCs) for publishing in open access journals. Since the Wiley open access publishing agreement went into effect in April 2023, the eight articles published by Jefferson authors saved the university and authors about \$19,000.

East Falls Special Collections & Textile and Costume Collection

The Design Center on the East Falls campus, home to the Textile & Costume Collection, had a busy year. In addition to hosting "Hanger Making Hangouts," where students learned to create archival hangers for objects in the collection, staff digitized the entire collection of Dorothy Liebes textile samples (nearly 700 pieces). These samples are accessible via Jefferson's JSTOR collection.



Another digital collection added was the <u>Thomas Jefferson University- East Falls Historical Photo Archive.</u> The East Falls Special Collections team digitized a wide range of yearbook images of sports clubs, fashion shows, classroom learning, loom equipment, and more. The collection highlights the various eras of the school's history.

In late Spring 2023, the Center City Archives & Special Collections began an expansion project. After years of discussion around desired improvements for storage and exhibition space, Dr. Marion Siegman, a long-time champion of the Archives, contributed a generous donation to renovate the Archives, now called the Siegman Archives.







The reimagined Siegman Archives, on Scott Library's 4th floor, will provide space to showcase the Collection's artifacts to the Jefferson community. Open exhibit space and shelves will highlight materials for students. Designated areas for programming and lectures will be used to host events, and newly constructed rooms for individual or group research will encourage scholars to interact with the Collection in new ways. The renovation will also allow for better storage and organization of the materials. The Siegman Archives are expected to open in January 2024.

The Office for Professional Writing, Publishing, & Communication

The Office for Professional Writing, Publishing, & Communication (OPWPC) expanded its impact in 2022-2023, supporting 14 more clients and helping 48 more works get published than the previous year. In total, the team reviewed 513 documents and 117 presentations.

From new online communities and self-paced learning modules to "drop in" in-person events and consultations, the Educational Technologies & Instructional Design staff got creative to provide Jefferson educators with teaching and learning expertise conveniently and effectively.

The instructional design team played an integral role in developing and launching new programs in the **College of Health Professions** this year.

In the **Respiratory Therapy program**, instructional design staff held weekly meetings with program directors, built course content, including a Canvas template, for instructors to utilize, and supported instructors with the adaptation of tools like Nearpod and Packback. The team will continue to build courses for Respiratory Therapy with educational best practices in mind.

Instructional designers also helped the **Medical and Laboratory Sciences program** with a redesign of online courses. Staff created a Canvas template, offered best practices around implementing technologies like Studio and Panopto into lectures, helped build a sense of community in the online courses, and provided strategies for assessment methods and techniques. Staff frequently met with directors, subject matter experts, and faculty throughout the process.

The Instructional Design team ran Jefferson's first-ever Ally Week, generating awareness among students and faculty around Ally – an accessibility tool within Canvas that offers learners alternative file types and provides faculty with "accessibility scores" and suggestions to improve their content. Partnering with graduate students in Jefferson's Occupational Therapy program, the team created student-facing resources and tabled at student spaces to educate learners about Ally. Workshops for faculty and messaging on Canvas gave instructors tips on how to use the accessibility tool, and a fun, low-stakes competition encouraged faculty to improve content. During Ally Week, instructors made 183 "fixes" in 26 courses, and 260 students downloaded 561 alternative file formats.

The **Scholarship of Teaching & Learning (SoTL) online community** also piloted this year. This group of seven included instructors and graduate students who provided support and offered guidance to each other as they discussed the steps involved in SoTL research, developed their plans, and shared progress.

In addition to providing educators with real-time online communities, Instructional Designers also developed three new self-paced learning modules. The Science of Learning, Effective Group Assignments, and Getting Started with the Scholarship of Teaching & Learning modules are accessible on the new Academic Commons website and instructors can explore these programs at their convenience.

Staff Highlights

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Audio Visuals, Graphics, Photography, & Videography

The Audio Visual Equipment Services, Graphics & Medical Illustrations, Photography, and Video Production teams saw significant increases in projects and requests. Highlights of the year include the Photography team's involvement in Jefferson's 199th Commencement, where they snapped over 10,000 images (see below), and the Videography team's support of Jefferson's second annual TedX event. The Audio Visual team received **over 2,000 more requests** than the previous year. Graphics and illustration requests almost doubled from the previous year (260 requests).











