YOUR JEFFERSON CAP

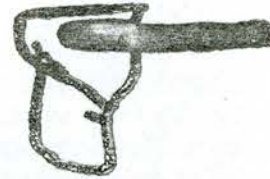
In case you've been wondering how to wash and iron your Jefferson cap, here are a few helpful hints which will make your job easier.

First, when laundering do not add any kind of perma starch as it will fill up the pores of the cap and make it too stiff.

When ironing, it is best to use an armboard, and to iron the top of the peak first.



Then the sides and the back of the peak can be done.



Best results are achieved with the brim when it is stretched out and then ironed across. You should iron in for this procedure.



The brim should just cover the stitching when folded over; approximately one-eighth to one-quarter inch. Spray starch may facilitate maneuvering of the brim.

For anchoring, either white bobby pins or a single hat pin should be put in the back or a hat pin can be placed on either side of the peak coming in toward the center of the peak.

The above hints combined with a little practice and patience should give you "the perfect Jefferson cap."

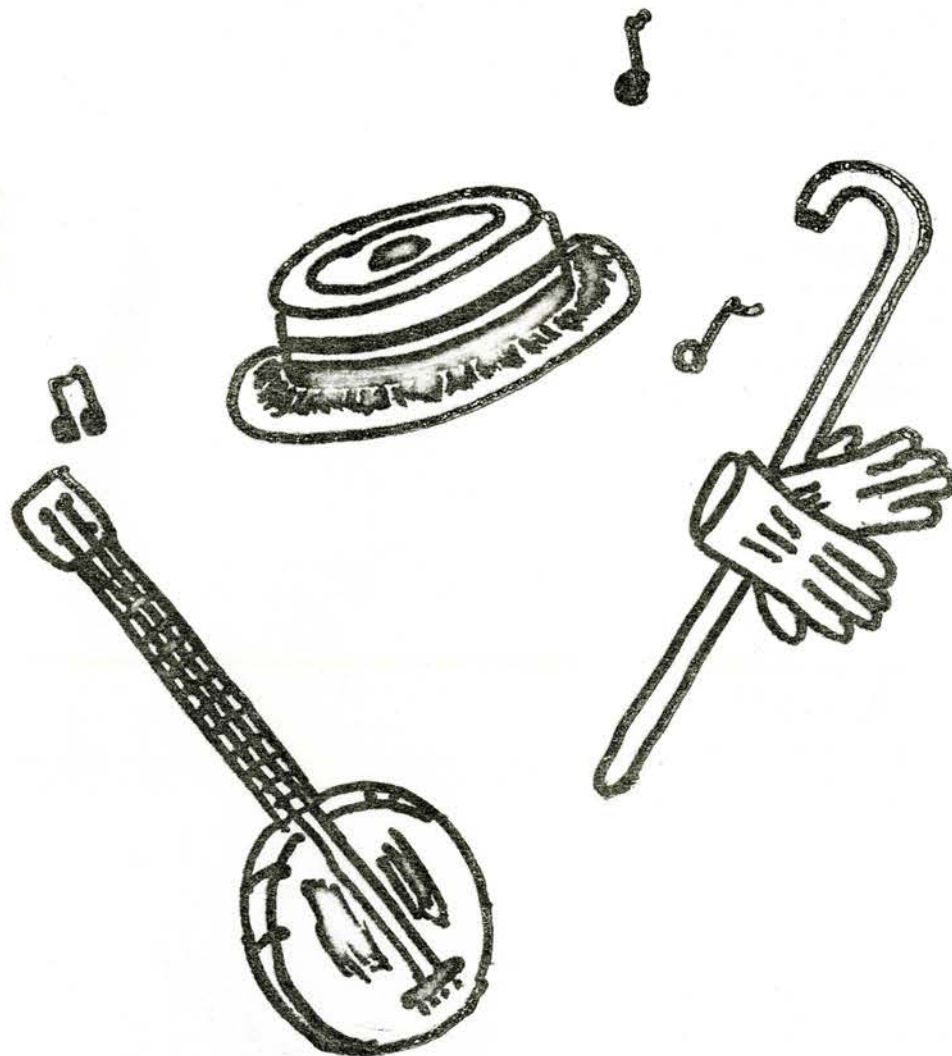
