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### **BOOST YOUR COMMUNICATION SKILLS WITH NATURE**

**Excerpt from the unit on writing scientific papers:** “Scientific papers, like any other form of professional communication, are about getting messages across. To make sure you focus on the so what, create your scientific paper in a top-down fashion. First, work on the macrostructure: Select the content for your paper and organize it in a reader-friendly way, paying special attention to the beginning and the end. Then, work on the mid-level structure: Deliver one message with each paragraph using clear, accurate, and concise sentences. Finally, work on the microstructure: Polish your paper all the way down to the smallest details of the language.”
