Dreamcatcher Workshop With Native Nations Dance Theater

Dreamcatchers originated in the Ojibwa Nation, but during the pan-Indian movement of the 1960s & 70s they were adopted by Native Americans of a number of Nations. They came to be seen as a symbol of unity among the various Nations, and as a general symbol of identification with Native Americans.

Traditionally, dreamcatchers hung above beds of children as a charm to protect against nightmares. The Ojibwa believe that a dreamcatcher filters a person's dreams.
