## New Resources

If you conduct qualitative research, the new [NVivo Community](#) is for you. NVivo is not new to qualitative researchers, but this new feature of the support tool offers an opportunity to collaborate with other researchers. By [joining](#) the **NVivo Community**, you'll be able to connect with other researchers through NVivo Research Networks, share your research, and find new funding.



**LabArchives Inventory** is an easy-to-use tool that streamlines the organization, tracking, and ordering of lab inventory items. Team members can search by item name, type, and location. The system is highly customizable and links to your LabArchives Notebooks. 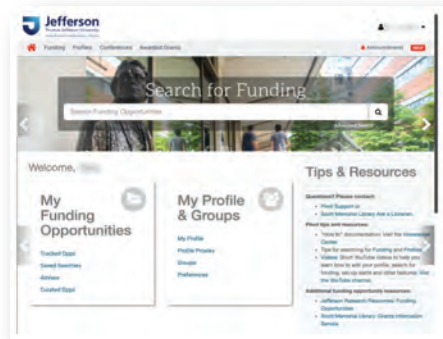


## Grants & Funding

## Statistical Tools

**SPSS 27 Premium:** If you are not using SPSS 27, upgrade the statistical tool to take advantage of new premium features, including complex samples, exact tests, and neural networks. If you are using SPSS 27, these enhancements will be automatically available to you after you restart the program. For installation instructions, [visit the library website](#). ## Citation Tools

We have multiple citation tools to help you keep track of your research. Find out which is perfect for you:

**Sciwheel:** F1000, a popular citation manager, is now called [Sciwheel](#). This reference manager helps you organize your sources, share citations with colleagues, read and annotate full text, and insert citations into documents.



**EndNote 20:** Late last year, EndNote updated its interface design for Mac and Windows, making the tool more intuitive for users to operate. EndNote 20 makes it easier to read and annotate PDFs and search and dedupe references. Read more about the [EndNote updates](#) and [install](#) the new version.

**RefWorks:** Both editions of the popular reference manager (Legacy and ProQuest) are supported at Scott Memorial Library. We suggest users create an account using the [Legacy version](#).

## Publishing & Communication

Faculty and staff can consult the [Office for Professional Writing, Publishing, and Communication](#) for free editing support and assistance at any stage of their writing, publishing, or presentation development process. The **Jefferson Digital Commons** (JDC) serves as Jefferson's open access institutional repository. It's a great resource to share your scholarly work and find that of other faculty, staff, and students. Visit [jdc.jefferson.edu](http://jdc.jefferson.edu) to check it out.

The latest trend in publishing is **preprints**, and last semester the Scott Memorial Library got in on the movement. In celebration of Open Access Week, we hosted a virtual panel event, Preprints Perspectives, where experts discussed preprint benefits to authors, best practices for servers, and more. Check out [that recording on the JDC](#). In other preprints news, [Scopus added preprints](#) to author profiles, reflecting that preprints are an important part of the research cycle. The journal *eLife*, a peer-reviewed open access journal for the biomedical and life sciences, announced that beginning summer 2021, it will only review preprint publications for its journal. And the [NIH Preprint Pilot](#) is underway. Learn more about [preprints](#).

All Jeffersonians creating scholarly works are encouraged to create an **ORCID iD**. The Open Researcher and Contributor Identifier (ORCID) is a persistent digital identifier given to authors that allows researchers with similar names to be easily distinguished from one another by the scholarly and publishing community. An ORCID iD will follow an author throughout their career, creating a stable scholarly identity across name, location, and institutional affiliation changes.

In the near future, through the Office of Faculty Affairs, TJU will introduce the Interfolio platform for faculty annual performance reviews, A/P/T, and other uses. Having an ORCID iD with a curated list of works will enable a smooth transition of publications from CVs to Interfolio. Learn more about ORCID by [watching this video](#) and [reading this flyer](#).
