ANNOUNCEMENT.

THE next session of the Jefferson Medical College will commence on the second Monday, being the fourteenth day of October, with a general introductory lecture by one of the Professors. The regular lectures will begin the day after. The session will terminate on the last day of February. Opportunities will be afforded for the prosecution of Practical Anatomy from the commencement of October. The General Dispensary of the College, which the students of the College have the exclusive privilege of attending gratuitously, will be in active operation from the commencement of September. The College Clinic, connected with this, affords admirable opportunities for the student to learn the practical parts of his profession, and the proper application of the principles which he is taught from the various chairs. The clinic is richly supplied with medical and surgical cases, and throughout the session it forms a prominent, and, in the estimation of the Faculty, a most important element of the educational course. The patient is examined, prescribed for, and if a surgical operation is needed, it is performed before the class. The rationale of every conclusion, and of every prescription is expounded by the clinical professor; and diagnosis, prognosis, and therapeutics are thus intimately investigated and elucidated.

The lists of medical and surgical diseases exhibit the great variety of cases brought before the students, and as the patients seek advice at the clinic, they may be regarded as representatives of the class who apply for assistance—medical and surgical—at the office of the practitioner. For certain cases, the Faculty have provided hospital accommodations in a building in immediate connection with the College—thus enabling the surgeons to perform not only the minor but the more serious operations, as lithotomy, amputation, &c., before the class, without risk to the patient.

During the past year, a vast number of medical and surgical cases received treatment. The surgical operations performed amounted to above 300, and included amputation of the leg; various plastic operations; extirpation of the mamma and tonsils; lithotomy; tenotomy; operations for cataract, harelip, ankylosis, hernia iridis, staphyloma, and hydrocele; for the removal of hemorrhoids and tumors of various kinds; for the ligation of arteries and for varices; for fistula in ano; for strabismus and ununited fracture, caries and necrosis; for stricture; for dislocations and fractures, &c. &c.

The hours of attendance at the clinic of the College are so arranged as to permit the students to attend, every Wednesday and Saturday, the clinics held at the Pennsylvania Hospital, and the Philadelphia Hospital. Professor Pancoast is one of the surgeons of the former; and Professor Gross of the latter. At both these institutions, the advantages are great for the practical observation of medical and surgical cases.

The city is, indeed, rich in its hospitals, infirmaries, and dispensaries, for the treatment of disease in general. It has, moreover, institutions designed for important specialties,—for the diseases of the eye and ear, for obstetrical cases, &c., and numerous private courses are energetically conducted by competent individuals, in which practical subjects are illustrated by the examination and treatment of cases. It is obvious, however, that during the regular course of lectures the time of the student must be so much occupied with his college studies, that he can only avail himself of a part of the clinical riches with which he is so bounteously surrounded.

The Museum of the College is amply provided with materials for demonstration, and is well fitted for illustrating the various departments.

In the Course on Surgery, the Professor will devote several lectures to Military Surgery.

With the termination of the session, Professor Meigs closed his connection with the Institution as one of its Faculty of Professors. The Board of Trustees publicly expressed their regret on the occasion, and their high sense of the value of his longcontinued services; in testimony whereof, he was appointed by them Emeritus Professor of Obstetrics and Diseases of Women and Children; thereby, much to the satisfaction of his colleagues, retaining his association with the College.

The Faculty, in taking leave of one with whom they had been united for twenty years so delightfully and so successfully, directed that a minute, of which the following is a copy, should be entered on their record.

"The Faculty of the Jefferson Medical College of Philadelphia receive with deep sorrow the intelligence of the contemplated resignation of their distinguished colleague and friend,

Professor Meigs.

"For a long time he had expressed a desire to withdraw from the incessant labors of the most arduous branch of an arduous profession. Still, the Faculty had indulged the hope that it might be practicable for him to persist in his successful career of instructing others, which had ever been a labor of love with him, and to be content with abandoning, gradually or wholly, the practice of his profession.

"He has decided otherwise, however, and sighs for retirement, away from the busy scenes to which he has been accustomed in civic life; and all must admit, that if any one

can be entitled to a dignified leisure it is he.

"The Faculty will part with him with intense and enduring regret. Never could any one have more closely applied himself to the execution of the responsible duties that have devolved upon him; and when sickness and sorrow have afflicted him, he was never absent from the amphitheatre at his accustomed hour, without feeling keenly the privation.

"That he may reap every anticipated advantage from the course he has laid down for himself for the future, and may long be preserved to the cherished circle, to which his continued existence is so important, and to the world of science, is the fervent wish of his col-

leagues."

Whilst the Faculty unfeignedly deplore the withdrawal of their excellent colleague and friend, they are happy to announce the appointment to the vacant chair of Dr. William V. Keating, who has been for many years extensively engaged in obstetrical and general practice in Philadelphia; has been favorably known, as a teacher in the Philadelphia Medical Association, to a large number of pupils; and has enriched the literature of his department by numerous and varied contributions.

The examinations are so arranged as to permit the Commencement for conferring Degrees to be held as early in March as is practicable.

There is likewise an examination of candidates for graduation during the first week of July. The degrees are conferred on the candidates who are successful at this examination at the Annual Commencement following.

The candidate must be of good moral character, and at least twenty-one years of age.

He must have attended two full courses of lectures in some regular and respectable Medical school, one of which shall have been in this College, and must exhibit his tickets, or other adequate evidence thereof, to the Dean of the Faculty.

He must have studied medicine for not less than three years, and have attended at least one course of clinical instruction in an institution approved by the Faculty.

He must present to the Dean of the Faculty a thesis of his own composition, correctly written, and in his own handwriting, on some medical subject; and exhibit to the Faculty, at his examination, satisfactory evidence of his professional attainments.

If, after examination for a degree, the candidate, on ballot, shall be found to have received three negative votes, he shall be entitled to a fresh examination. Should he decline this, he may withdraw his thesis, and not be considered as rejected.

The degree will not be conferred upon any candidate, who absents himself from the public commencement, without the special permission of the Faculty.

FEES.

The fee to each member of the Faculty is fifteen dollars, payable in advance, making in the whole 105 dollars.

The matriculation fee is five dollars:—to be paid the first session only. The fee for the diploma is thirty dollars.

By means of a postal regulation, money can be sent in letters duly registered with more safety than formerly.
