DOCTOR OF LAWS-JOSEPH LEES EASTWICK

Joseph Lees Eastwick was graduated from Cornell University in 1919 and immediately entered the business world as Treasurer of James Lees and Sons Company. In 1938 he became President of the company and from 1960 to 1970 was Chairman of the Board.

His talents in management and business have brought him directorships of numerous companies and corporations, including the Budd Company, General Accident Fire and Life Assurance Corporation, Ltd., Pennsylvania General Life Company, and the Central Penn National Bank.

Long interested in education and health care, he is a member of the Board of Trustees of Ursinus College and Thomas Jefferson University. He also serves as an advisor to his alma mater—Cornell University. Mr. Eastwick was awarded the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws by Ursinus College.

He served in the Army of the United States in World War I as a First Lieutenant of Field Artillery. During World War II he was active in the American Red Cross serving as Chairman of the fund raising committee in Montgomery, Delaware, Bucks, and Chester Counties.

Mr. Eastwick was appointed a life trustee of Jefferson Medical College in 1943 and continues his many years of faithful and distinguished service to the institution as a Trustee and member of the College Committee.

DOCTOR OF PEDAGOGY-JOHN BARRICK MONTGOMERY

A Pennsylvanian by birth, Dr. Montgomery prepared for the study of medicine at Juniata College, receiving the A.B. degree in 1921. After attending the Graduate School of the University of Pennsylvania he entered Jefferson Medical College, graduating with the M.D. degree in the Class of 1926.

Following internship at Jefferson Hospital, Dr. Montgomery became private assistant to Dr. Brooke M. Anspach. He rose rapidly in faculty and professional ranks to Professor of Obstetrics and Gynecology at Jefferson Medical College and to Co-Chairman, and then Chairman, of that Department. He held this position until his retirement in 1965 when he advanced to Emeritus Professor and Emeritus Attending Obstetrician and Gynecologist. He is also Emeritus Director of the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology at the Methodist Hospital in Philadelphia, Consulting Obstetrician and Gynecologist to the Bryn Mawr Hospital, and former Consulting Obstetrician and Gynecologist to the Germantown Hospital.

Dr. Montgomery is a most effective teacher both in the classroom and at the bedside, having influenced the lives of some seven thousand students by his abiding dedication to Humanism in Medicine and by his life-long personification of the highest ideals of his profession. The esteem in which his students hold Dr. Montgomery determined their choosing him as a subject of their traditional Senior Class Portrait (Class of 1965) and by their selecting him, in 1964, to receive the Christian R. and Mary F. Lindback Award for Distinguished Teaching. Dr. Montgomery's honors are many, including honorary degrees. He is a Past President of the Alumni Association of Jefferson Medical College and generously contributes of himself as Trustee of educational and medical institutions.

The deliberations of numerous professional medical societies and associations, at local, state, and national levels have been enhanced by Dr. Montgomery's dynamic participation. His widely recognized contributions to the medical literature on topics relating to advances in diagnosis and treatment of the diseases of women have appeared in professional journals, textbooks, and addresses.

Dr. Montgomery continues in active professional practice and remains clearly a leader among the most highly respected, loyal and active members of the Nation's largest medical Alumni body, that of Jefferson Medical College.

DOCTOR OF SCIENCE—DAVID M. DAVIS

David M. Davis, M.D., Emeritus Professor of Urology, was born in 1886 in Buffalo, New York. Following graduation from Princeton University (B.S., 1907), he attended Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine, receiving the M.D. degree in 1911 with Phi Beta Kappa and Alpha Omega Alpha honors. He served his internship and residency in Baltimore and, preparing for a career in scientific medicine, took advanced studies in chemistry in Germany.

His academic career started at Johns Hopkins in 1912 as Assistant in Pathology, then as Pathologist and Director of Research of the famous Brady Urologic Institute. He became an Assistant Professor of Surgery in charge of Urology at the Univerity of Rochester School of Medicine and Dentistry. He returned to the Hopkins and then spent five years in Tucson, Arizona, as Visiting Urologist at the Desert Sanitarium before assuming, in 1935, the Chair in Urology at Jefferson Medical College as the Nathan Lewis Hatfield Professor of Urology and as Urologist in Chief, Jefferson Hospital. He advanced to Emeritus Professor of Urology and Visiting Urologist upon retirement as Chairman of the Department of Urology in 1951. Continuing his professional activities, he was then appointed Visiting Lecturer at the Graduate School of Medicine of the University of Pennsylvania and Consultant in Urology at the Bryn Mawr Hospital.

An exceptionally stimulating teacher, Dr. Davis is equally creative in research, starting with his student days in Baltimore. Over one hundred forty scientific dissertations and books on urologic topics demonstrate his signal contributions to his specialty field. His studies continue, especially in urinary tract hydrodynamics; this work is being continued by his former students as well.

Dr. Davis has received many honors for professional excellence and for outstanding contributions and achievements in Urology, among these are the Edward L. Keyes Gold Medal of the American Association of Genito-Urinary Surgeons, the Silver Plaque of the American Urologic Association, and the coveted Hugh H. Young Award Gold Plaque for outstanding contributions to the field of urinary tract infections.

Dr. Davis served in the First World War, first as Bacteriologist in the Pennsylvania Hospital Unit, American Ambulance Hospital (Paris) in 1915, then with the British Expeditionary Force, and later in the American Expeditionary Force, continuing in the Reserve Corps until 1933 with the rank of Major.

Holding regular and honorary memberships in American, British, Greek, Mexican and Argentinian professional societies, as well as in those societies reserved for those who have reached unusual heights in learned pursuits, Dr. David M. Davis stands among the medical practitioners, scientists and academicians, who have significantly advanced their specialty fields, added luster to American Medicine, and whose influence extends throughout the medical world.

DOCTOR OF MEDICAL SCIENCE—GEORGE ALEXANDER HEARD

A native of Georgia, Dr. Heard received the A.B. degree from the University of North Carolina where he won Phi Beta Kappa honors, and the M.A. and Ph.D. degrees from Columbia University while preparing for a remarkably successful career as educator, social and political scientist, author, university administrator, and advisor to Presidents of the United States.

Faculty appointments began at the University of Alabama, and his academic career was continued at North Carolina where he rose to Professor of Political Science, then at Harvard University as Ford Research Professor of Government. Returning to the faculty at North Carolina, he became Dean of the Graduate School. In 1968 he was called to his present position as Chancellor of Vanderbilt University and Professor of Political Science.

Dr. Heard's outstanding contributions and service in our Nation's interest include activities under the Civilian Conservation Corps, National Park Service, Works Progress Administration, Department of the Interior, Office of the Secretary of War, United States Foreign Service, National Aeronautics and Space Administration, United States Arms Control and Disarmament Agency, and Department of State. He also has acted as Administration Officer, Health Division, United Pueblos Agency of the United States Indian Service. During the Second World War he served his Country in the United States Navy.

Dr. Heard's creativity and counsel have aided research in vital areas of government and political science, especially in modern political functions and behavior. He has held editorial and advisory positions for the *Journal of Politics* and the *American Political Science Review*, and is a *Director of Time Incorporated*. Through his numerous articles and several books he has enriched political science literature. His leadership contributes also to many learned organizations dealing with political, social, governmental, educational, and cultural advances.

In the forefront of educational affairs and administration and in community affairs, he participates in learned organizations concerned with the problems, challenges and opportunities occurring at all levels of education, with race relations, and with the problems of governance of the academic medical center; as Trustee and President of the Board, he has a prominent role in establishing the policies and in implementing the functions of the Ford Foundation. He has been the logical choice for appointment to study and research commissions dealing with political and educational matters of national significance by Presidents Kennedy, Johnson, and Nixon. Dr. Heard accomplishes these challenging assignments with great distinction.

THE ACADEMIC COSTUME

The wearing of academic dress dates back to the early days of the oldest universities in the world. In the American Council on Education's book entitled "American Universities and Colleges" it is suggested that "gowns may have been counted necessary for warmth in the unheated buildings frequented by medieval scholars. Hoods seem to have served to cover the tonsured head . . ."

Throughout the years European universities have continued to show great diversity in their academic dress. American universities, on the other hand, when they decided to adopt academic dress about fifty years ago, immediately established a code of regulations which today is followed by almost all American institutions. The establishment of this code has made it possible to distinguish the Bachelors, Masters, and Doctors and at the same time recognize the university which has given them the degree.

The Bachelor's gown has pointed sleeves and is worn closed. The Master's gown has oblong sleeves, open at the wrist. The rear part of its oblong shape is square cut and the front part has an arc cut away, and is worn open or closed. The Doctor's gown has bell-shaped sleeves. It is worn opened or closed. Cotton poplin or similar material is used for the Bachelor's and Master's degrees, and rayon or silk ribbed material is used for the Doctor's degree.

The hoods vary in length: 48 inches for the Doctor's degree, 42 inches for the Master's, and 36 inches for the Bachelor's. All hoods are lined in silk in the academic color or colors of the institution conferring the degree. If the institution has more than one color, the colors are shown in divisions using chevrons. The binding or edge of the hood is usually made of velvet in the color designating the subject in which the degree was granted.

Black mortarboards are worn for all degrees.
