The second meeting was for a much different audience on a very focused topic that relates to some of our work here at the Lab, human systems integration. The Human Systems Integration Symposium was sponsored by several organizations, including the Society of Naval Architects & Marine Engineers, Human Factors and Ergonomics Society, and my employer, the

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Johns Hopkins University Applied Physics Laboratory. It was held in March in Annapolis, Maryland. It too had concurrent sessions
