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
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

Perpetual motion devices were a common feature of machine books in the Renaissance and seventeenth century. These machine books contained plans for a variety of practical devices to move or lift heavy objects, pump or raise water, or grind grain. Since perpetual motion machines will not work, however, the books provide evidence that many of the devices depicted were never actually built. This particular machine shown on the cover uses a waterwheel to turn a grindstone. The waterwheel also drives an Archimedean screw, which raises the water back to the top of the waterwheel sluice, providing a "perpetual" source of energy.
